



Her career led her to International Data Corporation (IDC), an industry analyst firm that was focused on global technology markets. According to Chris, their data is used by financial analysts, Wall Street, and the government, but the most important audiences for IDC data are the companies themselves, who use it to make many of their corporate decisions.

Chris was a global account manager (aka salesperson). Her last eight years with the company, she was the global account manager for IBM, one of IDC's three biggest clients.

When Chris moved back to Sarasota about 10 years ago, she continued to work remotely for IDC. "As long as I had a laptop, my cell phone, and lived near an airport, everything was good."

Chris has two daughters, one in the technology field in Berlin and the other a stay-at-home mother of three. Chris also has a stepson and two Vietnamese foster children, now both adults, who were eventually reunited with their parents in Dallas.

Once back in Sarasota, Chris became aware of Forty Carrots through the organization's co-founder Betsy Kane-Hartnett. The two women were in the same book club and Betsy urged Chris to get involved with the Forty Carrots Advisory Board.

Chris quickly became immersed in Forty Carrots, first through the Advisory Board and then as a member of the Board of Trustees. It was during her second term that she was asked to serve as chair.

It was during this time that the importance of Forty Carrots took on a very personal meaning for Chris. Due to a family crisis, Chris's only granddaughter at the time, 4-year-old Charlotte, came to live with her in Sarasota. Chris enrolled her in the Forty Carrots Preschool and then in VPK the following summer. "She loved all of it, of course," Chris said, and the therapy she received was extremely helpful.

"What has cemented me to Forty Carrots over the years is its mission and the people who execute that mission," she said. "The more I learned, the more enamored I became with all we are able to do, and the more I was persuaded that our only issue is that we need to do more."

Chris said she felt very fortunate that, as a child, "While we had really limited resources, and things were difficult sometimes, I always felt safe and stable and loved and supported."

She added that today she feels very fortunate that her own family's issues have smoothed out. "But the fact is that when things did go off the rails for a while, we were so fortunate to have Forty Carrots available to us."

As for the future, Chris says building a new facility because of overcrowding is at the top of the priority list. "We are managing to add new things now, even though, as Michelle Kapreilian likes to say, 'there is no room even for a paper clip.'" She also anticipates expanding the work being done with Forty Carrots' current community partners, adding that they may add a few new community partners, as well.

"There are no 180-degree turns in our future," she said. "Rather, we will build on our successes, slowly and carefully. I am so honored to be included in my little way in the Forty Carrots' mission," Chris said. "As a child, I had those things that we try to give to the children at Forty Carrots every day. I know what a difference that makes. We are changing one young life at a time, but, beyond that, we are impacting generations of young lives in the future."

The group meets once a week and is a safe space for the children to discuss their feelings and any difficulties they might be having. During the group's first introduction meeting, students were asked to color individual puzzle pieces which were then assembled together. This exercise illustrated the fact that although each student brings their own unique perspective and qualities to a situation, together they can create a cohesive group.

"There are so many benefits to children who participate in group therapy, especially providing a way for them to feel heard and supported. Beyond this, we hope they will also foster friendships, and learn how to communicate with each other — all skills that will last a lifetime."
